GSS Harmonisation



- GSS Harmonisation Team is part of the GSS Best Practice and Impact Division
- Work on a number of different topics, for example Health, Gender Identity, Housing
- GSS website contains agreed survey questions ('harmonised principles') and user guidance
- Run the Harmonisation Champions Network
- Workplan approved by Heads of Profession

Why harmonise?



Improve comparability and coherence of statistics

Our strategy has three main goals:

- Increase consistency in definitions and classifications used in data collection across government
- 2. Improve communication on coherence in statistical publications
- 3. Enhance the value of data through the integration and combination of distinct data sources





- OSR's systemic review highlighted that there
 was 'limited advice' about the comparability of
 homelessness statistics and that existing advice
 was 'confusing and incoherent'
- As part of cross-GSS Housing Work Programme, conducted research to develop an understanding of UK definitions of homelessness and potential for creating a harmonised definition
























Across the four UK countries, there are differences in:

- the legal definitions used e.g. priority need
- the data collection systems used e.g. applicants vs outcomes









- Develop more comprehensive guidance within statistical publications
- Create a homelessness 'conceptual framework'
- Long-term, consider how to overcome barriers to harmonisation and explore other ways to improve UK comparability




















Total decisions on applications: Scotland 2004/05 - 2017/18








For the first time, we're able to begin building a UK-wide picture of homelessness.

Coverage and feedback



This is a great permanent resource.

Homelessness rockets among the over 60s as the number of older people seeking help rises by almost 40% in five years, alarming new figures show

- · There's been a rise in older people in the UK asking for help with homelessness
- · At the same time, number of people aged 16-24 asking for assistance has fallen
- · According to the figures, 2,500 people over 60 have asked for help in England

Major rise in homeless older people as thousands of over-60s seek help

ONS figures show a 39% increase in over-60s seeking help, up from 1,800 in 2012-13 to 2,500 five years later

The ONS said the data should be treated with caution due to variations in recording practices across the UK.
