COUNCIL OF SOCIAL SERVICE FOR WALES (Inc.)

The Council is an independent agency formed in 1946 as a nonprofit making incorporated Company registered as a Charity. It grew out of the South Wales and Monmouthshire Council of Social Service which was established in 1934.

The Council exists to bring together voluntary bodies in free association so as to pioneer, develop and strengthen work throughout Wales in social welfare, health, education and community development, in consultation with central and local government and in co-operation with other agencies.

The Council provides, through the work of its staff and committees, information, advisory, training, secretarial and organisational services to associated organisations and community groups, to professional and voluntary workers, and to the public at large.

The Council acts on behalf of Trusts, Charities and other bodies to offer practical help and financial assistance.

The Council maintains close liaison with a wide range of organisations with similar interests and functions throughout the United Kingdom and abroad.

CYNGOR GWASANAETH CYMDEITHASOL CYMRU (Corff.)

Ffurfiwyd y Cyngor yn 1946 fel Owrnni Cortforedig di-elw; mae'n uned annibynol ac yn gofrestredig gyda'r Comisiwn Elusennau. Datblygiad o Gyngor Gwasanaeth Cymdeithasol De Cymru a Mynwy a ffurflwyd yn 1934 yw'r Cyngor presennol.

Mae'r Cyngor mewn bodolaeth er mwyn dwyn ynghyd holl fudiadau a symudiadau gwirfoddol. Rhoddir pwyslais ar gyfathrach rhydd rhwng y mudiadau tynw er mwyn arloesi, datblygu a chryfhau gwaith cymdeithasol trwy Gymru gyfan. Fe ymgynghorir a'r llywodraeth ganolog, llywodraeth leol a swyddfeydd eraill wrth weithio yng nghylchoedd lles, lechyd, addysg a datblygiadau bywyd bro.

Trwy waith ei swyldogion a'i bwyligorau fe rhydd y Cyngor wybodaeth a hyfforddiant i fudiadau a grwpiau proffesiynol i wirfoddolwyr ac yn wir i'r cyhoedd yn gyffredinol. Hefyd fe drefnir ysgriferyddiaeth a gwasanaeth trefniadol i nifer o gymdeithasau.

Fe weinydda'r Cyngor ar ran Ymddiriedolaethau, Elusennau ac awdurdodau eraill er mwyn cynnig cymorth ymarferol ac ariannol.

Fe ddeil y Cyngor gysylltiad a chylch eang o fudiadau tra thebyg eu diddordebau a'u hamcanion ym Mhrydain ac mewn gwledydd tramor.

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Officers Executive Committee Membership: Other Bodies (National) Individual Membership Associated Bodies Staff Finance: Income and Expenditure Account Balance Sheet In my foreword last year I said that the newly built foundations of the Council would not show results immediately. I am glad to say that these are now beginning to show more quickly than I had hoped. In the past year, the Council has worked with increasing co-operation with Local Authorities and County organisations which have turned more and more to it for help and guidance. This period has coincided with the publication of the Wolfenden Report, which enhances the recognition of the work done by the voluntary movement and the Council is gratified by the favourable references made to it in the Report.

One of the most satisfying features of our work over the past year has been the involvement in projects designed to deal with unemployment. The training schemes carried out last year for the Manpower Services Commission have resulted in the MSC asking the Council to increase this work, so that currently 500 young unemployed people either have been or are being trained throughout Wales. The Manpower Services Commission has expressed its appreciation of the Council's work on its behalf and there is an increasing co-operation between both bodies. I would like to pay a thoute both to the Training Officer and the Director's staff in regard to this achievement.

The new schemes with the MSC have resulted in an expansion of our staff, which has increased from 15 to 31 as a result of the new funds provided to carry out this vital role. Our budget has increased from £80,000 to £230,000, although I should point out that these funds do not produce a profit to the Council. However, if looked at in business terms, this is a threefold increase in turnover which is a measure of the Council's success in providing services which have assisted the welfare of a large number of individuals.

One of the major achievements of the Council in the past year has been the progress of the new office in North Wales and the Field Officer for North Wales is constantly forging new links with voluntary organisations in the region. The addition of three new Field Officers within the Council has enabled it to keep close links with the grass roots orgnisations throughout the Principality. Simultaneously, the Information Department has greatly expanded and doubled its output of information material.

The work summarised above represents a transformation of the Council's activities and augurs well for the future of it's role of service throughout Wales.

Yn fy rhagair llynedd dywedais na fyddai sylfaeni newydd y Cyngor yn dangos canlyniadau yn syth. Yr wyf yn faich o gael dweud fod hyd wedi digwydd ynghynt nag y digwyliad. Yn y flwyddyn diwethaf mae'r Cyngor wedi cyd-weithredu ymheliach gyda Awdurdodau. Lleol a Mudiadau Sirol sydd wedi rior ia to fwyfwy am gymorth a chyngor. Mae'r cyfnod yma wedi cydddigwydd a chyhoeddiad Adroddiad Wolfenden, sydd yn amlygu cydnabyddiaeth o'r gwaith a wneir gan y mudiadau gwifoddol ac mae'r Cyngor yn gwerthfawrogi y cyfeiriadau ffafriol a wneir amdano yn yr Adroddiad.

Un o'r agweddau mwyaf boddhaol o'n gwaith rtos y flwyddyn diwethaf oedd ymgymryd a chynlluniau i atal diweithdra. Ar ol dablygu'r cynlluniau hyfforddi llynedd mae Comisiwn Gwasaneth Gweithwyr wedi gofyn i'r Cyngor gynhyddu'r gwaith, ac felly yn gyfredol mae 500 o ieuenctid diwaith drwy Gymru un ai yn cael hyfforddiant neu eisioes wedi ei dderbyn. Mae Comisiwn Gwasanaeth Gweithwyr wedi datgan ei gwerthlawrogiad o waith y Cyngor ar ei ran ac y mae mwy o gydweithrediad hwng y ddau gorff. Hoffwn ddatgan teyrnged i'r Swyddog Hyffordi ac i saft Cyfarwyddwr am y campwaith yma.

Mae'r cynlluniau newydd gyda'r Comisiwn Gwasanaeth Gweithwyr wedi golygu cynhyddiad yn ein staff o 15 i 31 gyda'r arian ychwanegol a roddwyd i gario'r gwaith gwysig yma allan. Mae ein cyllideb wedi cynyddu o 280,000 i £230,000 er fe ddyliwn bwysleisio nad yw'r arian yma yn cynhyrchu eiw i'r Cyngor. Foddynag, wrth edrych aron mewn fermau busnes mae hyn yn gynydd driphlyg ar ein cyfanswm busnes sydd yn linyn mesur o lwyddiant y Cyngor i olalu am wasanaeth sydd wedi rhoi cymorth i lawer iawn o unigolion.

Llwyddiant mawr i'r Cyngor yn ystod y flwyddyn oedd datblygu gwaith yng Ngojedd Cymru trwy sefydlu swyddfa newydd ac mae'r Swyddog Maes yn esfydlu perthynas gyda'r mudiadau gwirfoddol yn gyson. Mae penodiad tri Swyddog Maes wedi sicrhau cysylltiad agos ar mudiadau lleol drwy'r wlad. Ar yr un pryd mae'r Adran Hysbysrwydd wedi datblygu'n fawr ac wedi dyblu y cynnyrch o ddefnydd y mae'n anton allan.

Mae'r gwaith sydd wedi ei grynhoi uchod yn rhoi portread o'r trawsffurfiad yng ngwaith y Cyngor ac yn argoell'n dda i'r dyfodol yn ei ran o wasanaeth drwy Gymru.

DIRECTOR'S REPORT

The year under review was the first in which the newly structured Council faced its fresh objectives. Its policy has been to concentrate upon two priorities. The first was to strengthen its position as a forum for the Voluntary movement in Wales, and the second to promote work associated with the problems of unemployment. Details of how the Council and its staff set about meeting these goals form a major part of the report. Departmental Officers give details of these activities but it is necessary to emphasize the principles motivating these major par-occupations.

If the Council has any reason to exist then it is as the voice of the Voluntary Sector in Wales. During the year the report of the Wolfenden Committee on The Future of Voluntary Organisations' was published. For the first time in thirty years an objective appraisal was made of the role and growth of Voluntary Groups and volunteers. This Council's work received support in principle from the Committee, who saw for the national Councils in the United Kingdom an increasingly important role. The C.S.S.W. has vectomed this report and has joined with the other national Councils in submitting their reply to Government. In turn, Government has issued a Consultative Document — The Government and the Voluntary Sector.

The following are steps the Council has taken subsequent to the publication of the Report:----

It submitted oral and written evidence to the Committee.

When the Report was published a Conference of over 100 organisations was held in Cardiff early in 1978 to discuss the Report when Lord Wolfenden was the Guest Speaker.

At the request of Government over 400 copies of the Consultative Document have been distributed to National and Local Voluntary Organisations, accompanied by a letter urging them to reply to the questions raised either directly to Government or through this Council.

The Council has set up a Working Party representing most of the large National Voluntary Bodies in Wales to consider sending a joint reply to the document by January 1979.

In all these activities the Council, in common with the other National Councils, is stressing the need for greater recognition by Government of voluntary effort. In Wales many organisations face unprecedented difficulty, not only because of deep economic distress but because the sources of their finances, both statutory and charitable are severely curtailed. The C.S.S.W is convinced that if Government is serious in acknowledging that the flight against social injustices can only be won by the help of the Voluntary Sector then there is obvious need to bring It into consultation and decision making at an earlier and deeper level than hitherto. There is also urgent need for Government to set up a system of funding whereby volunteers are not subject to the whims of occasional hand-outs, but are assured of a reasonable and realistic financial basis on which to plan for the future.

Turning to its second priority, (trying to off-set the effects of unemployment), the Council has had considerable experience. In its first report in 1934, the old South Wales C.S.S. said it had come into being to help meet the tragedies of 228,000 unemployed. Forty-four years later the Council, at the request and with the encouragement of the MSC in Wales, has taken a leading role in calling voluntary bodies together to plan training programmes, both for young people and the older unemployed. A great deal of this report is given to describe this ploneering role.

Conferences held at the request of the MSC, at Rhoose in South Giamorgan, and at Colwyn Bay, Ciwyd, have brought together over 200 Voluntary and statutory agencies to discuss the Governments Special Measures. The Training Officer and other Officers are constantly applying themselves to devising and stimulating training programmes. Schemes already in operation have been acknowledged as significant pioneering projects which have drawn wide attention throughout the United Kingdom.

Although pre-occupation of the above two objectives have been paramount, other activities of the Council have continued at a more even, if less spectacular pace. The information Division has extended its network of contacts with Voluntary and Statutory Agencies. A regular pattern of communication has been established in addition to the scores of requests for advice and information that are received week by week.

The establishment of a North Wales Office with a resident Officer in post has fulfilled one of the Council's long cherished ambitions. During the early months of his appointment Arthur Wynne Hughes, our first Field Officer, has contacted dozens of voluntary and statutory agencies, and is establishing a framework of co-operation throughout the three Counties. Following a most generous gesture on behalf of the Transport and General Workers Union, who freely gave office accommodation at Shotton for twelve months, a new permanent office is now established at Wrexham.

Two new appointments of Field Officers in South Wales have meant that there is a deepening of existing relationships between voluntary bodies and the Council. Fresh relationships are being formed with groups with whom the Council has not had opportunity of working. One of the most significant services rendered by the C.S.S.W. in the past three years has been that of the National Referral Service for the Adult Literacy Programme in Wales, and we are glad that the Council is to be offered a new contract from the Adult Literacy Support Service Fund.

Other non-Departmental activities of the Council are described in the Report and altogether this has been a year of stimulating and exciting expansion.

Appreciation

The Council wishes to thank The Welsh Office, the Manpower Services Commission, the Carnegie U.K. Trust, the J. T. Morgan Foundation, individual subscribers and business firms for their practical support of its work. As ever, the Honorary Solicitor and the Auditors have been always ready to help and advise and the Council is indebted to them.

Executive Committee

The staff have been greatly encouraged by the very active participation of the new Chairman, Lord Lisburne, in the affairs of the Council. His regular visits and constant, almost daily, enquiries and practical help have been of enormous value. We also join in thanking Mr. George Wright and Mr. John Williams for their unfailing support and help during the year. A note of special thanks is due to the North Wales members, who are so regular in their attendance, both at Caerphiliy and at special Committies held in the North. During the year, the following new members were welcomed to the Executive:—

Personal

During the year the Council lost, through death, the service of Mrs. Jenny Jenkins, JP., a Vice-President, who was a founder member of the Council, and former National and Welsh President of the Association of Womens Clubs. No one can ever think of the Womens Clubs without appreciating her long and distinguished leadership.

The Council also mourns the passing of Mr. R. L. Jones, General Secretary of the Welsh Y.M.C.A's, a very valued old friend.

On a happier note, the Council has congratulated Dr. Joyce Rowley upon the award of OBE. Dr. Rowley is Chairman of the Wales Council of the Disabled, and a former member of the Executive.

The Council was delighted to hear that Mr. William Hall, who recently left our employ after thirty-seven years service, was awarded the Queens Jubilee Medal. This is an honour richly deserved.

ADRODDIAD Y CYFARWYDDWR

Mae'r flwyddyn dan sylw y gyntaf lle mae fframwaith newydd y Cyngor wedi gwynebu ei amcanion newydd. Mae ei bolisi wedi canolbwyntio ar ddau flaenoriaeth sef crythau ei safle fel fforwm i'r mudiadau gwirtoddol yng Nghymru, a hefyd i hynwyddo'r gwaith yn gysyltiledig a di-weithdra. Mae manylion su mae'r Cyngor a'i staff yn gwynebu'r nôd yn flurtio rhan helaeth o'r adroddiad. Mae Swyddogion Adrannau yn rhol'r manylion o'r gweithgareddau, ond mae'n bwysig pwysleisio yr egwyddorion a'r cynheiliad tu ô'i hyn.

Os oes rhesvm i fodolaeth y Cyngor yna fel llais i'r Sector Gwirfoddol yng Nghymru yw hynnu. Yn ystod y llwyddyn diwethaf cyhoeddwyd Adroddiad Pwyligor Wolfenden ar "Dyfodol y Muciadau Gwirfoddol". Am y tro cyntaf mewn deng mlynedd a'r hugain cafwyd prislad wrthrychol ar ran a thwf Grwpiau Gwirfoddol a Gwirfoddolwyr. Cefnogwyd gwaith y Cyngor yma mewn egwyddor gan y Pwyligor a oedd yn gweld rhan bwysicach i Gynghorau Cenedlaethol yn y Deyrnas Unedig. Mae Cyngor Gwasanethau Cymdeithasol Cymru wedi croesawu yr adroddiad yma ac wedi ymuno a chynghorau cenedlaethol eraill i anfon ateb i'r Llywodraeth. Fel canlyniad mae'r Llywodraeth a'r Sector Gwirfoddol.

Dyma'r camau y mae'r Cyngor wedi gymeryd ar ôl cyhoeddi'r Adroddiad:---

Anfonwyd tystiolaeth ysgrifenedig ac ar lafar i'r Pwyligor.

Ar ôl gyhoeddi'r Adroddiad cafwyd cynhadledd o dros 100 o fudiadau yng Nghaerdydd ar ddechrau 1978 i drafod yr Adroddiad gyda'r Arglwydd Wolfended yn ŵr gwadd.

Ar gais y Llywodraeth antonwyd dros 400 o'r Ddogfen Ymgynghorol i Fudiadau Cened laethol ac'i Mudiadau Gwirfoddol lleol ynghyd a llythyr yn ei hanog i ateb y cwestiynnau a godwyd un ai'r Llywodraeth neu drwy'r Cyngor yma.

Mae'r Cyngor wedi sefydlu Pwyllgor Gwaith yn cynyrchioli rhan fwyaf o'r Mudiadau Gwirfoddol Cenedlaethol yng Nghymru i ystyried anton ateb i'r ddogfen erbyn Ionawr 1979.

Drwy'r holl weithgareddau yma mae'r Cyngor, fel y Cynghorau Cenediaethol eraill wedi pwysielsio fod angen mwy o sylw o waith gwirfoddol. Yng Nghymru mae llawer mudiad yn gwynebu anhawsterau digyffelyb, nid yn unig oherwydd fod ffynhonnell eu cyllid, boed yn elysengar neu stadudol, wedi ei gwrogi. Mae Cyngor Gwasanaeth Cymdeithasol Cymru o'r fam os yw'r Llywodraeth yn credu o ddifrif mae'r unig ffordd i ymladd anghyfiawnder cymdeithasol yw drwy waith y Sector Gwirfoddol yna fe ddylid cael mwy o drafodaethau a phenderfyniadau yn gynharach ac yn ddyfnach na sydd eisioes wedi ei gael. Mae'n angenrheidiol I'r Llywodraeth sefydlu sustem arlannol lle nad yw gwirfoddolwyr yn ddibynol am rhwy ambell elusen ond fod yn rhaid iddynt gael sefyllfa ariannol realistig er mwyn cynllunio ei gwaith at y dyfodol.

Blaenoriaeth arall yw ceisio ymgodymu ac effaith di-weithdra ac yn hyn mae'r Cymor wedi cael profilad helaeth, Yn ei Adroddiad cyntaf yn 1934 dywedodd yr hen Gyngor Gwasanaeth Cymdeithasol De Cymru ei fod weith Deugain mlynedd yn ddiweddiarach mae'r Cyngor ar gais ac annogaeth y Comisiwn Gwasanaeth Gweithwyr yng Nghymru wedi chwarae than flaenorol drwy alw mudiadau gwirfoddol at ei gilydd i gynllunio rhaglenni hyfforddi i'r ifanc di-waith yn ogystal a phobl hŷn. Rhoddir rhan helaeth o'r Adroddiad yma i ddisgriffor rhan arloesol yma.

Deeth Cynhadieddau yn Rhŵs ac ym Mae Colwyn, ar alwad C.G.G. a thros 200 o fudiadau stadudol a gwirfoddol ynghyd i drafod Mesurau Arbennig y Llywodraeth. Mae'r Swyddog Hyfforddi a Swyddogion eraill yn brysur dyfeisio a hyrwyddo rhaglenni hyfforddi. Mae'r cynlluniau eisioes ar waith wedi ei cydnabod fel maes arloesol pwysig sydd wedi dwyn cydnabyddiaeth eang drwyr 'P beyrnas Unedig.

Er fod y blaenoriaethau uchod wedi bod yn rhan bwysig o waith y Cyngor mae gweithgareddau eraill wedi ei cyflawni ond nid efallai ar yr un raddfa. Mae'r Adran Hysbysrwydd wedi ehangu ei gysylliad a'r Mudiadau Gwrifoddol ac eraill. Mae patrwm rheolaidd o gyfathrebu wedi ei syfydlu ac y mae myrdd o aiwadau am hysbysrwydd a chyngor yn cael ei derbyn o wythnos i.

Mae serydlu Swyddfa'r Gogledd gyda Swyddog Maes wrth waith wedi cyflawni un o hen ddyheadau'r Cyngor. Ym misoedd cyntaf ei benodiad mae Arthur Wynne Hughes, ein Swyddog Maes cyntaf, wedi cysylthu a dwsinau o Fudiadau Gwirfoddol a Chyfreithiol ac mae'n sefydlu ffrarnwaith o gydweithrediad drwy'r dair Sir. Yn diyn cynnig haeitonus gan Undeb Cyffredinol y gweithwyr cafwyd benthyg Swyddfa yn ddi-dal am flwyddyn, ond erbyn hyn mae swyddfa newydd barhaol wedi ei seyfydiu yn Wrecsam.

Mae penodi dau Swyddog Maes yn Nê Cymru yn golygu fod dealltwriaeth dynach rhwng y Cyngor a Mudiadau Gwirfoddol. Mae perthynas newydd yn cael ei datblygu gyda mudiadau na chafodd y Cyngor gyfle i weithio gyda nhw o'r blaen.

Un o'r gwasanaethau amlycaf a roddodd Cyngor Gwasanaeth Cymdeithasol Cymru yn y dair blynedd diwethaf oedd Gwasanaeth Cyfeiriol Cenedlaethol i Raglen Dysgu Darllen ac Ysgrifennu i Oedolion Llythrenedd yng Nghymu ac yr ydym yn falch fod y Cyndor yn cael cynnig cytundeb newydd gyda Chronfa Cefnogi Gwasanaeth Llythrenedd Oedolion. Mae gweithgareddau eraill y Cyngor wedi eu disgrifio yn yr Adroddiad ac ar y cyfan mae hi wedi bod yn flwyddyn o ddatblygu a llwyddiant.

SECTION A

CENTRAL SERVICES

TRAINING

YOUTH UNEMPLOYMENT

Work Preparation and Social and Life Skill Training

Following a considerable period of work and negotiation the Council embarked upon a limited programme of four week Social and Life Skill Courses in South Wales in July 1978. The courses under the sponsorship of the Training Services Agency almed at effecting the transition from school to work for selected groups of 16 to 18 year olds. Four courses were operated at the Council's Headquarters at Caerohilly, and at Sports Centres in South and Mid Glamorgan. A total of 45 trainees, without formal qualifications, engaged in a training programme covering communication, skills, social education, work preparation, and work experience on employers premises. The provision has been directly supported by the Careers Service and evaluated by the T.S.A. London.

The pilot programme concluded in April 1978 and a satisfactory review was followed by the submission of a proposal for a new programme to be operated from September 1978 to December 1979. This successful project application involving a further 30 courses in the eight Weish Counties, is a significant break-through for a major voluntary organisation, and will provide nearly 400 unemployed young people with a new training opportunity. The Council proposes to share its experience with local voluntary groups and to develop both the course content and material with a view to encouraging others to participate in programme for the unemployed.

Community Youth Opportunities Project

The first integrated training programme for the young unemployed in the United Kingdom was launched under the Council's sponsorship in May 1978. The Project, financed by the Manpower Services Commission nationally, is piloting, through a multidisciplinary approach, a number of components of the Manpower Services Commission, Youth Opportunities Programme. The Project is being operated from Caerphilly and will provide valuable experience and material for many U.K. schemes under consideration.

The training includes Community Service and Work Experience modules and Life and Social Skill and Employment Induction courses over a period of 22 weeks. A total of 80 young people from four South Wales Counties are engaged in placements at residential homes, community projects and industry. The trainees are under the supervision of a team of eight staff employed by the Council. The Project is managed by a Council sub-committee of representatives from Training Opportunities, Careers Services, the Trade Unions, and the MSC. The Project developed from the successful programme of short courses utilising the training expertise gained. The Council welcomes the growing partnership between social service agencies and industry and hopes that the inter-agency cooperation exhibited in this project will result in improvements for the young unemployed and further recognition of the role of the voluntary movement.

Development of other schemes for the unemployed

The experience gained by the Council in training unemployed has been utilised in discussions towards participation of young people in MSC special programmes. Among the many agencies in close working contact with the Council are the National Youth Bureau, the National Council of Social Service Community Service Unit, Spina Bifda Association and Youth Alid — British Youth Council. In addition several voluthary groups have drawn upon the Council's expertise in the furtherance of local initiatives.

Social Work Training

During the current year the Council has retained its much valued links with professional social work training agencies including Schools of Social Work, The Central Council for Education and Training In Social Work and Social Service Training Departments. Placements arrangements have been maintained for CQSW students and the Training Officer continues to serve on the CCETSW Regional Advisory Group for short courses. In addition the Training Officer is the secretary to the Weish Association of Training Officers in Personal Social Services thereby providing a link between statutory and non-statutory social service training agencies.

Pre-retirement Development

The steady progress towards wider provision for those effecting the transition from work to retirement has involved the Council in several significant ventures. The Training Officer has been actively involved with Conferences for Course Tutors and for Training Officers and Personnel Officers from industry organised by the Pre-retirement Council launched in South Glamorgan by the CSSW in 1976. A further Conference for industry organised by the Glamorgan Polytechnic was addressed by the Training Officer and further discussions have been held towards local courses. Assistance has also been given to the Bridgend Technical College.

INFORMATION

The Information Officer assumed full responsibility for the Department on July 1st, 1977 and this report deals with events from that date.

The transfer from Administration Officer/Head of Clerical Services to Information Officer required considerable adjustment even though the provision of information had long been part of the officers duties prior to the setting up of the Information Department in 1973.

Changes of staff within the Department and a move to a new office within Llys flor made a complete re-organisation essential, not only to house the Information Bank but in order to meet the new objectives of the Council. Neediess and outdated material was disposed of, and what remained was made easily accessible.

There are over a hundred sections, stored alphabetically, and while the voluntary organisations rightly have pride of place, importance is also given to the supply of information about a wide variety of Statutory, National and local subjects. The following is a random selection:

The Department's Library covers a wide range of subjects from 'Who's Who' to Devolution, as well as reference volumes indispensible to the volunitary movement. House of Commons legislation is covered by Hansard, and social and community work journals are not only circulated among the Council's own Member Bodies but stored for future reference and enguiries.

In addition to the Council's own Information Department several other specialist Information Centres have been established in the area, often working in complete isolation. It was felt that some initiative was needed to form a link between these to avoid over-lapping and the Officer set out to foster an espirit de corps and a means of communication and exchange between one centre and another.

These efforts produced a most happy outcome and now the speed of answer to almost any query is quite remarkable. From one of the following sources within the network a solution can be found to most enquiries:—

- 1. The Welsh Office Information Department
- The Department of Health and Social Security Information Officer

- The National Council of Social Service Inform ation Service (London)
- E.R.I.C. Educational Resource and Information Centre. (Sponsored by the Manpower Services Commission).
- The Welsh Centre for International Affairs Development Resource Centre.

Directory of Voluntary Organisations

In December 1977, an updated Directory of Voluntary Organisations was produced with the help of South Giamongan Social Services Department. Constant requests for such lists are received and the publication has been an aid to the Field Officers in their task of seeking out and aiding these groups. The search for funding is a never-ending one within the Voluntary Movement, and the Department almost daily assists and advises on sources of grant-aid.

The Council's two copies of the Directory of Grant Making Trusts are without doubt the most sought after volumes in the small library at Lys Ifor, and the thousands of smaller trusts unable to be listed in the Charities Aid Fund Directory, are constantly scoured for lesser, though equally welcome donations. Help has also been sought with the drafting of letters from new groups inexperienced in appealing to Trusts.

Bulletin

The Department's budget permits a modest quarterly Bulietin. The first issue was sent to threehundred voluntary groups and reaction eagerly awaited. The now familiar edition, with its distinctive green heading, has been increased to four hundred copies by popular demand and constant further requests now justify further increases in numbers.

Involvements

During the past nine months there have been several opportunities of involvement in the wider aspects of the Council's work, particularly where a team effort is necessary. These include:—

Life and Social Skills Courses for the Young Unemployed

Administration of the appointment of the North Wales Field Officer

Granada TV Series Reports Action

Distribution of the Consultative Document on the Holland Report

Presentation and editing of the Wolfenden Committee Report followed by its Distribution

Rhoose Conference on Youth Opportunities and Special Temporary Employment Programmes.

Meetings and Outside Visits

These have been deliberately kept to a minimum in order to deal with daily inquiries. Calls for help come In many guises, and as we are judged by the speed and warmth of our response, it is essential that the Officer is readily available. It was however a wetcome (eature of the nine months' work to attend both the Annual General Meetings of the National Council of Social Service and International Social Service of Great Britain, and to meet with colleagues whose names and volces had become familiar over the years.

Committee Work

One of the most satisfying areas of the Officers former duties lay in the Servicing of the Council's various Committees and these remain as part of the yearly round.

Careful record keeping and detailed attention to preparation are an essential forerunner of smooth and congenial meetings. This, and assisting with the proof reading of the Annual Report and its eventual distribution have made the adjustment to the post of Information Officer more enjoyable.

THE BBC ADULT LITERACY PROJECT

The Adult Literacy Referral Service for Wales, based at Caerphilly, entered its third and final phase of the initial three year Project during the year under review.

The main purpose of the Referral Office is to act as a back-up to the 'On the Move', 'Your Move', 'Nove On' and 'Next Move' programmes whose main aim is to motivate anyone with reading, writing or spelling problems to come forward and seek help.

At the close of each and every 'On the Move' programme the Caerphility telephone number is screened, hittially, potential Adult Literacy students are encouraged to look for the adult literacy sign within their own area where help is readily available. If they are unable to find help locally, or would prefer contacting an anonymous third party for advice, potential Adult Literacy students are encouraged to contact the Referral Office on Caerphilip 869444.

The telephone lines at Caerphiliy are constantly manned during the week and Sundays by Volunteers and the Officer in charge. The volunteers have been specially trained in telephone answering techniques and cope with the day to day manning of the office.

When a potential Adult Literacy student telephones the office the person accepting the call puts the caller at ease and the only information required is the name and address of the student, telephone number (if they are on the 'phone) and whether their family is aware of their problem. In many cases their families are unaware of their problem and wish them to remain so. Their particulars are then passed on to someone in their own area who can help them, i.e. the local Education Authority.

The Council of Social Service gratefully acknowledges the assistance of the volunteers without whose cooperation the scheme would be unable to operate efficiently. Several of the volunteers have manned the telephone at Caerphilly since its inception in October 1975.

During the last year the organiser has been in constant contact with the Adult Literacy Officers of the eight local Education Authorities in Wales, and has circulated pamphlets and literacy documentation to those Departments.

Nationalised Industries, General Practitioners, Opticians, Dentists, Job Centres, Employment Exchanges, Unemployment Benefit Offices, Social Security, Sub-Post Offices and many other Organisations have been circulated with the new poster 'It's never too late to learn'. This multi coloured poster has had great response.

The Pen-Pal Scheme started in Wales continues with great success. The response has been very encouraging and the Scheme enables Adult Literacy students to correspond with one another. All students are asked to fill in their own name and address on the form in their own handwriting. The forms are then returned and matched with a student with a similar reading age capability and interest.

It is very worthwhile to the organiser and volunteers when they receive a letter from a student who is thrilled with their Pen-friend and by the fact that they can write to one another.

It is gratifying to note that since the inception of the Project it is estimated that at least 9,000 individuals in Wales alone have come forward for help. For every student that comes directly through this offlice two go straight to their Local Authority.

NOTE: The three year Agency for the Scheme comes to a close in Soptember 1928. And the Council has now entered into a new agreement with the Adul Literacy Support Services Fund which is now the Charli's responsible for this work. throughout the United Kingdom. The scope of the Scheme is to be extended to include not only those who have problems with specific but alose along to the those immigrants who wish to bare Teglish as a second language, with the basic purpose of finding employment and of setting into community life in British. These are new challenging the tautes of the Referral Service and efforts are currently being made to cope with the exits deminds that are being made when the new series of programmes are shown both on B.B.C. and Commercial Televicion throughout the county

Mise Judith Huton, who has been for nearly two years the organiser of the Scheme is leaving her pool to return to undertake a further College Course. Her successor has yet to be appointed, but the Council is deeply conscibus of the debit towes the local volunteers who have undertaken to run the Referral Service unit a permanent appointment is made. The Executive Committee is of the opinion that this service is one of the most voluable the Council has undertaken during recent years.

SECTION B

COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT

FIELD WORK

A major feature of the re-organised Council has been the appointment of Field Officers. Mr. J. E. Brooks was appointed in November 1977, Mr. Arthur Wynne Hughes on January 1st, 1978, and Mr. T. Mullins on July 1st, 1978.

The priority task given these Officers was to make immediate contacts with local and statutory organisations at grass root level. It will be appreciated that the Council has not been generally identified by its own name but was better known by its Departments such as Age Concern (Wales). Council for Voluntary Youth Organisations, Wales Council for the Disabled, and in former years Citizens Advice Bureau, Rural Community Advisor, Drama Association of Wales, and Welsh Association of Women's Clubs. The Council has never stressed its own umbrella role, indeed, every member of staff was engaged for work in specialised Departments. It is not surprising that confusion has arisen in certain quarters about the Council's functions, especially in North Wales, where before last year it has not been able to maintain a physical presence.

All this has now been altered and from January 1st, 1978, an office has been working from Shotton. As from October 1st, 1978, a lease has been taken of new premises at 57a King Street, Wrexham. This will now be a permanent focal point for our activities throughout North Wales.

In South Wales the two Field Officers have been given distinct and different responsibilities ---

Mr. J. E. Brooks is Field Officer (Projects), and amongst other duties is responsible for maintaining links between Central and local statutory authonities and for Projects such as Social rehablitation in areas such as East Moors and Ebbw Vale, where massive redundancies have made social conditions much worse for local communtites and the plight of many who are already disadvantaged much worse.

He is also involved in arranging meetings in conjunction with the E.E.C. on subjects relating to the Social Fund, and is convening meetings of Voluntary Organisations to explain the consequences to them of direct elections to the European Parliament.

Mr. Mullins is Field Officer (Organisations), and has particular responsibility for working directly with County based Voluntary Bodies in South Wales, Councils of Voluntary Service and the many hundreds of local Community Action and neighbourhood groups. It is obviously too soon yet to make any assessment of work that has only been in operation for some months, but it is obvious that the need for co-ordination and consultation has been recognised by an over whelming number of Voluntary Groups. It is already clear that some do not feel the need to coordinate or integrate with the other Groups and have indicated that they are essentially Pressure Groups who have their own individual approach to Social Work and that their radical philosophy does not easily conform to the traditional pattern of Voluntary work.

This is fully appreciated by the Council which can never claim to represent all Voluntary Agencies but there is ample evidence that the solid work of the staff in the last year has resulted in formal links being established and strengthened between the Council and National Voluntary Organisations and some hundreds of Local Agencies. The Information and Training Services offered have been followed up by personal visits by our Field Officers and a solid basis for future cooperation is gradually being laid.

Three of the largest Conferences ever held in Wales involving Statutory and Voluntary Bodies have been arranged by our Field Officers in the past twelve months. The first of these was at the South Glamorgan County Hall where a Conference was held in January to consider the Wolfenden Report, and the two others were Conference called (at the invitation of the MSC) at Rhoose and Colwyn Bay. At each of these Conferences there have been over one hundred organisations present and the aim of the Council to act as a forum for Voluntary Organisations has been amply demonstrated to be viable.

The Field Officers in both North and South Wales have been heavily involved in assisting in the launching of the Community Youth Project for Wales and the 'Life and Social Skills Courses'. Thus the small team of Field staft worked closely in achieving the two main objectives of the year.

It was felt essential that the Council should maintain close links with those Organisations which became independent on April 1st, 1977, and the Director and Field Officers have attended Executive Meetings, and have not only been kept fully informed of their activities but participated in them.

The Director has accepted an invitation to become an observer to the Welsh Association of County Voluntary Councils (formerly known as the Standing Conference of Rural Community Councils) and together with Mr. Arthur Hughes attended their Annual Conference at Tanybulch, Gwynedd. Regular contact is being maintained with these organisations through the Field Officers. The Council has also been involved in current discussions between the Welsh Office and the County Bodies on their future funding by Central Government.

Whilst the foregoing account of the Council's work covers the main feature of the years activity, there are several other aspects which may be mentioned, and which do not easily fall within the scope of any Department:—

Charity Registration and Advice

The Council receives regular updated lists of amended and new Charities for the whole of the United Kingdom. Through these records and other information we have been able to deal with dozens of requests from Voluntary Groups as to which Charities they can apply for financial assistance. As the financial hardships of these Bodies increase so do their requests for information.

The Director is currently Chairman of the James Edward Harris Trust.

Agency Work

The Council has continued to act as a distributing Agency for the B.B.C. Childrens Fund throughout Wales.

The King George Jubilee Trust continues to use the Council as its Agent in distributing funds for specified purposes amongst Youth Groups involved in Community Work, and several worthwivile schemes have been given support.

We continue to provide a secretariat for the Merthyr Educational Settlement Trust, Another significant Agency is that for the South Wales Missions to the Deaf and Dumb, whose Registered Headquarters are at Lys Ifor.

The Council has acted as a designated Body authorised by the Department of Transport to issue permits to Voluntary Organisations under Regulations of the Mini Bus Act 1977.

The Council is a participating Member of the United Kingdom Committee for the National Year of the Child. This organisation will be celebrating in 1979 the Twentieth Anniversary of the Declaration of the Rights of the Child and will campaign in each Country to increase the efforts to implement those rights, with particular emphasis on disadvantaged children. This world wide effort is the result of a special resolution of the General Assembly of the United Nations.

The Council is also involved in the work of the Steering Committee towards an association of Broadcasters, Voluntary Organisations and Statutory Organisations involved in social action.

It is impossible to list all the facets of social action in which the Council is connected either directly or indirectly through its affiliated or associated members, as they range through a wide spectrum which includes Housing, Deprivation Problems, Intermediate Treatment, Crime Prevention, Postal Services, Gambling, Human Rights, Pre-school Playgroups, Silver Jubilee activities, Hospital Welfare Organisations and Community Social Work Training.

Co-operation continues with other National Councils through Meetings of Directors and Senior Staff of the Four National Councils of Social Service

in the United Kingdom. Meetings were held during the year at London and Edinburgh. A great deal of benefit is derived from discussion of policies and programmes.

During the year the C.S.S.W. has been involved with the other National Councils in the following:---

Grants for Community Projects

Together the National Councils were able to persuade the Department of Education and Science not to alter the system of Capital Grants for Community Projects. The Department wished to transfer responsibility for such grants to Local Authorities but the Voluntary Movement throughout the United Kingdom campaigned against this move and eventually the Secretary for State decided to retain the system in its traditional form.

Rural Problems

The Council has joined in discussions affecting Rural Community life and co-operated with the Rural Department of the N.C.S.S. in producing evidence showing difficulties experienced in Rural Transport and the closure of Village Schools.

International Committee

The four Councils have by mutual consent set up a new International Committee which meets regularly and which has replaced the former N.C.S.S. National Committee. The new Committee will advise the Executive Committee of the four Councils on all International aspects of their work and serve as the United Kingdoms National Committee of the International Council of Social Welfare.

European Committee

The Council is also a member of the European Committee of the N.C.S.S. which is now being reorganised and it is hoped it will become the European Committee of the four National Councils. It is proposed that each of the four Councils will also have their own separate Committee which will concern themselves with Social and Economic affairs and co-operate with the National Offices of the E.E.C. in the four countries.

The C.S.S.W. continues to offer help and advice to Voluntary Movements in Wales who wish to make applications for grants to the E.E.C. The Wales Office of the E.E.C. encourages Voluntary Organisations to adopt this procedure and there is a very close link between the E.E.C. representatives in Wales, his Staff, and this Council.

Legislation-Monitoring Service for Charities

Through the N.C.S.S. the C.S.S.W. is involved in this new service which is designed to help charities keep abreast of legislation, which not directly affecting them, has some impact on their work. This Committee has influenced the Government in maintaining a status quo by exempting charities and Churches from the National Insurance surcharge proposed under the Finance Acts of 1976 and 1977. This Committee provides an early warning system so that individual charities or groups of charities can make representatives to Government on matters affecting them. The four Councils, through the N.C.S.S., were able to persuade the Inland Revenue that covenanted donations to charities would be unaffected by the new 25% tax band announced by the Chancellor of the Exchequer in his budget speech.

Fuel Bills

Representations have been made to Government which resulted in another scheme being introduced to assist low income groups in meeting their electricity bills, incorporating a flat rate payment of £5, as well as a discount on bills. This scheme applies to those who receive Supplementary Allowance, Supplementary Pension or Family Income Supplement.

N.C.S.S. Committees

The Chairman is a Member of the N.C.S.S. Executive Committee and the Director is an Alternate Member.

The Council is also represented on the Standing Conference Rural Community Councils of the N.C.S.S., and its Standing Conference of Councils for Voluntary Service. Members of staff always attend Annual Conference and other special convened meetings.

MEMBERSHIP

The Council has revised its list of Members and extended an invitation to several National Organisations to become affiliated members. Full membership of the Council is invariably granted only to National Organisations within Wales, or to those organisations within the United Kingdom which have an identifiable Welsh Committee. County Bodies and Local Organisations who receive the services of the Council, either through its Information Department or its Field Work, and who have formally decided to work with the Council are listed as Associated Members.

A full list of both Affiliated and Associated Members is contained in this Report.

FINANCE

Treasurer's Report

The Audited Accounts for the year indicate that the Council has succeeded in its energetic efforts to wipe out the deficit carried forward from the previous year.

In addition, it is pleasing to note that it has been possible to reduce the loan on the building by $\Omega_{4,000}$ due mainly to generous donations for this specific purpose.

The Accounts show an excess of Income over Expenditure of £13,288 but this figure does not allow for necessary expenditure of a capital nature during the year.

On the General Account we finished the Financial year with a credit Bank Balance of approximately 53,200, as against an opening overdraft of at its beginning of £7,686. Whilst this is a much more satisfactory position, it is still a matter of concern that the Council continues to operate on a financial knife-edge as it has no liquid reserves to meet unexpected contingencies or to allow for any real expansion of its activities.

Reference is made in this Report to a vasity increased budget for 1978/79, but it must be stressed that this is due almost entirely to Projects undertaken under the Government's Youth Opportunities Programme. Whilst it is hoped that these Projects will be entirely self-financing, there is the possibility that the Council may have to cover any short-fall in income, as funding for them has been predetermined on a fixed contractual basis.

Nevertheless, the Council is able to face its financial future with greater confidence than for many years past.
